

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

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LUKGRAPH's De HAVILLAND DH.90 DRAGONFLY 1:48 scale KIT No.48-10

Another 'In box' look by Pete M.



Designed in the mid-thirties, the prototype DH.90 made its maiden flight on 12 August, 1935. At £2,650 (a small fortune in today's money) it wasn't cheap, being essentially the small bizjet of its time and the private aircraft of such giants of British society as Sir Philip Sassoon and Lord Beaverbrook. Contemporary publications described it as 'a limousine airliner' with accommodation for four passengers and a pilot. It could also be used for training as there was provision for dual control, and although aimed at the luxury end of the market, most were used eventually for either commercial or military purposes. Production totalled 66, and ended in 1938.


While sharing a clear family resemblance to the DH.89 Rapide, the DH.90 was a smaller aircraft and unlike its 'cousin' had unequal span wings with a mild sweepback.


Lukgraph of Poland have produced the DH.90 in both 1:32 and now in 1:48 scale as per this review.


The major airframe components such as the fuselage, wings, rudder and fin, tailplanes, engine nacelles and cockpit interior have been moulded in a mid-grey resin.















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The cockpit interior fittings, three of the seats, the props and wing struts are supplied as 3D resin prints along with two beautifully reproduced DH Gypsy Major engines to fit inside the cowlings. Much of these will not be seen unless some of the cowling panels are cut out for display.






The cockpit glazing comes as a vacform moulding (2 supplied) and a clear nose cap with the fuselage window glazing supplied on a flat sheet. A pre-cut masking sheet supplies those needed for the canopy.







A small PE fret provides framing for the fuselage side windows, flat rigging wires for the centre span, the instrument panel outer face, seat belts, rudder pedals and many smaller airframe and interior details.



A small decal sheet has two instrument panel backings for the PE panel along with the compass.

The main decal sheets contain any national markings required for the options given in this kit with registration codes, DH logos for the fins and some pin-striping as required for two of the civil options.






Options in this kit are: G-AEDU in a Red scheme; ZK-AYR in a Blue scheme; G-AECW in an impressed RAF camo scheme of Dark Green/Dark Earth over Yellow; A Spanish Republican Air Force option in a Dark Green over Light Blue scheme (no decals provided so national markings will have to be painted on); S-24, A Danish Air Force aircraft in overall Silver, and 3*6 of the Swedish Air Force in overall Silver. All decals appear to be fully in register with no obvious faults.

The instruction sheet comes as a folded A4 booklet in colour, showing each step and includes most colour notes as needed at each step.







Note: For Kiwi modellers, ZK-AYR is based at the Croydon Aviation Heritage Museum, Mandeville, Southland

This kit is a fine example of the mixed media products coming from the smaller producers in Europe and uses that media in a common-sense way to allow a reasonably simple build. I never expected to see an almost mainstream kit of the Dragonfly appear so hats off to Lukgraph for this one.



Another RNZAF themed sheet from Ventura covers varied Corsairs from the Pacific Theatre of operations, a training school aircraft based at Ardmore in New Zealand and one from No.14 Squadron based at Iwakuni with the Occupation Forces in Japan in 1946.


Option 1 is an overall Glossy Sea Blue Vought F4U-1D NZ5485 operated by No.23 'Ghost' Squadron while based at Los Negros in August 1945. Faded upper surfaces with RNZAF roundels in six positions. Nose art on the port nose cowling consisted of the wording KOHIMARAMA IX over a Green Māori Tiki. Below the cockpit in white was the Grim Reaper 'Ghost' emblem adopted by No.23 Squadron from their working up period at Ardmore Airfield near Auckland. Being one of the first squadrons on the new Corsairs, the locals tagged them as the 'Ghost Squadron' as they were unable to see the pilots in the cockpits of these large aircraft!

Note: Follow Ventura's instructions carefully if using this option as the wing roundels consisted of overpainted US 'Stars and Bars' on the port upper and starboard lower surface and 'offset' thus had bars (decals15) but the port under and starboard upper were fully RNZAF added 'parallel' with bars and RNZAF roundel blue borders to the white bars (decals 18 and 22).

Option 2 is a Vought F4U-1D NZ5566 in the '4 Tone' scheme as used by the Fighter Leaders School based at Ardmore. white codes were only applied to training aircraft in New Zealand, and were never used on operational aircraft in the Pacific. The roundels have been overpainted in a smaller size with the lighter blue colour as used in New Zealand. This aircraft also has an extra 'splash' of colour with the nose cowl ring being painted Orange/Yellow

A small additional sheet contains the Bu.No. and the type (F4U-1D) fin and rudder markings for NZ5566.



Note: Both of the above options had the 'Barred' type canopy as did almost all of the F4U-1D's received by the RNZAF.

The last option is one I have a personal connection with as it was my late Father's 'charge' when serving in the ground crew with No.14 (Fighter) Squadron at Iwakuni base in Japan in 1946. NZ5617 was a Goodyear FG-1D in the overall 'Glossy Sea Blue' scheme. The upper surfaces appear almost matt in all photos of No.14's Corsairs with a still glossy under surface! Note: Goodyear built Corsairs did not have the matt anti-glare panels that Vought applied to it's F4U-1D's in the Glossy Blue scheme.

Before they left New Zealand, the roundels were overpainted with the pre-war 'A' type Red/White/Blue roundels and it appears the original roundels were painted out with what appears to be Ns. Sea Blue that appears surrounding the later additions. The name 'VERNA' (dad's girlfriend at the time, eventually to become my mother) appears in Orange/Yellow on the starboard upper cowl. There were two variations on this and the one given on this sheet is the later (and more professionally applied) one that appeared late in 1946. NZ5617 originally had the serial and last two on the fin and undercarriage covers in Black. After arriving in Japan, these were later repainted in White to match the rest of the squadron's aircraft which had White serials and numbers!

RNZAF Corsairs in Japan


As part of New Zealand's contribution to the British Commonwealth Occupation Forces in Japan (known in NZ as J Force), No.14 (Fighter) Squadron was reformed at Ardmore, south of Auckland, in December, 1945 and travelled to Japan on the aircraft carrier HMS Glory in March 1946.

The commanding officer was Squadron Leader J.J. De Willimoff, DFC, who had served with distinction in the Pacific, and commanded No.23 Squadron from it's formation

in August 1944 to 1945. The Squadron's ground training was put in the capable hands of Squadron Leader J.E. Duncan, known to all and sundry as "The Bull" due to his voice!

On 9 May 1947 NZ5617 "Verna" belly landed at Iwakuni. The pilot, Flying Officer P.K. Frame took off on an Army co-operation exercise but found that the undercarriage would not fully retract. He then tried to lower the wheels by various means; attempting to raise and lower the undercarriage, rocking the wings, making high "G" turns and flying at low speed, but all attempts failed. 
Package contains two decal sheets, V4897 and V489

Ventura Decals are printed thinly. Cut out each item ar stand on a non absorbent surface. At first the decal wil has loosened. Apply carefully to a gloss painted surface We suggest "Micro Set" and "Micro Sol" to aid setting a decal from this sheet that is not needed for your subir




VENTURA DECALS V48100 RNZAF DOUGLAS SBD DAUNTLESS, Pacific Theatre, No.25 Squadron Review by Pete M.




Another one from the current crop of revised and new issues from Ventura is this set covering the Douglas SBD Dauntless's of No.25 Dive Bomber Squadron in the Pacific theatre of operations.

The first is NZ5034, an SBD-4 used by No.25 when based at Pallikulo airfield on Espiritu Santo during their working up period. This aircraft was loaned from US marine Corps stocks and was in the original Blue Gray/Light Gray scheme. Large RNZAF Blue/White/Blue roundels were overpainted over the original US Stars on all four positions on the wings. A yellow outlined RNZAF roundel was painted over the original fuselage stars with a narrow white bar. No nose art shows in any of the photos of this aircraft.



All of these options had a narrow Red/White/Blue (with red forward) fin flash as used by the RNZAF. Note: All of the RNZAF's SBD's used the land based pneumatic tailwheel assembly as most of them came via US Marine Corps stock.

Another very useful set from Ventura as along with their set 4881, almost all of the RNZAF's Dauntless's can now be produced.
